Clean Marine BC (CMBC) aims to reduce potential environmental impacts of the boating industry through our volunteer eco-certification program for harbour authorities, marinas, and other boating facilities. We recognize our 45 certified facilities for their use of environmental best practices and continue to provide support tailored to each location in reaching their environmental goals. As well as other incentives such as reduced waste and costs, community support, and discounts.

We are excited to continue our boater outreach this season. CMBC trained volunteers distribute our free Clean Boater Kits to boaters at many different locations and events. Each kit is packed with spill supplies and resources including our Guide to Green Boating and other informational tools. We train our volunteers to have thorough conversations with boaters about all the tools in the kits.

I've had the privilege of walking the docks of some of the west coast Harbour Authorities and remain inspired by the important work that Managers and their teams are doing to operate their harbours serving as the gateway to the Pacific. During my conversations with local Harbour Managers I became vastly aware of the reliance on paper based and manual processes to maintain day-to-day operations and how much information is kept in their heads.

This presents both a risk and an opportunity.

The risk is that institutional memory and expertise may be lost as senior staff consider retirement and younger generations stepping into these important roles aren't interested in moving paper around when they know there are easier, faster ways to do things. This can be a big obstacle to succession planning and a significant risk to operational continuity. This is where the opportunity lies. The advancements in technology have made it possible for smaller, more cost-conscious organizations to streamline their processes, reduce administrative overhead and provide long term retention of, and access to, all kinds of data.

Forward-thinking leaders are beginning to think about digitizing moorage agreements and adopting POS systems to replace handwritten receipts. Replacing daily pen and paper "dock walks" with an app on an iPad can help to reduce the administration time it takes to document and report those statistics, while also making it possible to capture safety infractions, log and track maintenance issues, collect signatures and even invoice clients directly.

These incremental changes may seem small, but the savings and reduced costs and risks, and increased customer satisfaction are well worth considering for the long term success of Harbour Authorities.

How Do I Get Started?

We all know that technology can be the greatest enabler of our success or our biggest obstacle. The important thing is to prioritize your needs to optimize your investment. Rather than piece meal your approach to digitization, embark on a right size digital strategy roadmap that aligns with your overall business objectives. In other words, and as Stephen Covey likes to remind us, "begin with the end in mind".

What do you envision for the future of your harbour and the association? How will you preserve your legacy and set the next generation up for success?

Joseph Wright, Chairman for Gibsons Landing HA

It is with deep sadness that the Gibsons Landing Harbour Authority announced the passing of Dr. Joseph Douglas Wright, President of the GLHA board of directors. He was 81 years old. Joe was a man who enjoyed tackling the big problems. He was unfailingly committed to getting the job done and pitched in with his time and work ethic to find a solution, whether it was laying the foundation of his retirement home on Gambier Island with his wife or alerting a municipal government to address a public safety hazard. All problems had a solution in his limitless mind, they just required the right approach. - Education was important to Joe. He earned a degree in chemical engineering at the University of Alberta, followed by further study at Cambridge University. He joined the faculty of McMaster University in 1969, then went to work for Xerox Research Centre of Canada from 1977 to 1994. Then he went on to become the President and CEO of the Pulp and Paper Research Centre of Canada, until his retirement in 2006. He was the holder of six patents and served in many professional associations. He served on the Gibsons Landing Harbour Authority board of directors for 13 years, adding his expertise as the HA began an ambitious project of harbour expansion. His skills were pivotal in the addition of a drive-on float, the first step towards the goal of expanding the moorage capabilities of Gibsons by 100 slips. The task of being President of the GLHA fell to him in 2016, a position he devoted many hours to. Joe also served on the BC Ferries Advisory Board for Area F and a member of the Gambier Fire Equipment Group. May he rest in peace.

In Memoriam

Richard Michelson, Harbour Manager for Sointula HA.

Dick was born in Alert Bay, BC and called Rough Bay on Malcolm Island his home for all of his 94 years. Dick was a well-respected commercial fisherman; a highliner who owned and operated numerous boats over his long career on the ocean. The last boat he built was the "Island Sun" which is still in operation with family. As one of the founding members of the "Malcolm Island Lions Club" (MILC) in 1972, he was instrumental in the forming of the MILC Harbour Authority with SCH. He spent countless hours volunteering for the Harbour Authority with time, equipment and resources. He also was impetus behind the MILC taking over the Transport Canada Wharf in the centre of Sointula. Dick knew that there was no other community entity willing and capable of taking on this role. It was his desire to preserve the rich history of commercial fishing on the island and he was the inspiration behind creating the memorial to island fishermen lost at sea that stands at the entrance to the harbour. He also worked to ensure the maintenance of the community infrastructure for the benefit of the town's fishing fleet. Dick will always be a valued, cherished member of this community. Dick was also father to MILHA's current manager Lorraine Williams. A very devoted family!!
